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Week 3 Consonants: Double or Single?

Many English words use double consonants. They are there to signal the sound the preceding vowel should have. The best example of this is the word *dinner*. The double *n* signals that the *i* should have a short sound. If the extra *n* is left out, the word is *diner*. The *i* becomes long because of the *e* after the single n.

There are times when a writer may add a double consonant when none is needed. Look carefully at the words in the word bank so you can tell those that need a double consonant and those that don't.
